As we embark on a renewed journey of becoming the leading and top preferred aero-medical service provider. Our focus on provision of cost-effective, quality, and efficient aero-medical services to remote hard-to-reach areas and other places countrywide is key as this is the sure way to contribute to the improvement of the well-being of our fellow citizens. Collectively, the vision of the health reforms as a country is to "provide equity of access to cost-effective, quality health care as close to the family as possible". Clearly, there is inequitable access to basic health services in our country between provinces and between urban and rural areas. In urban areas, 99 percent of households are within 5 kilometers of a health facility compared to 50 percent in rural areas. Additionally, Long distances, cost, and lack of transport in these rural as sparsely populated areas heavily contribute to the inaccessibility of health services. During Rainy Seasons, some of these rural areas are impossible to access due to floods and water-logged roads and airstrips. As a result, people die from preventable or curable ailments because they fail to get medical assistance in time, unable to travel the long distance to the nearest medical facility.

Owing to the above, the need for supplementary health service provision in the said areas cannot be emphasized and this squarely sits on us as Zambia Flying Doctor service. With the recent appointment of our Board, the policy and strategic reviews have commenced, and as such we shall be able to operate within the confines of the approvals from the Board for enhanced Corporate Governance.

ZFDS 9-AGC SOARS INTO THE SKY AFTER 7 YEARS



After seven years of being grounded, 9J - AGC registered aircraft under the Zambia Flying Doctor Service (ZFDS) is back in Service this month.

The Aircraft was grounded in 2017 due to pilot error which resulted in the engine overheating and seizure while on a mission distributing medical drugs in Mamba, southern province.

Over the period of time other Aircraft components and items expired on calendar time and required an overhaul.

In July 2022, newly ushered management made a decision to have the engine of the aircraft overhauled in South Africa and it was returned back into the country on 11th May ,2023.

Installation of the engine commenced 23rd may to 26th May 2023 by Transvaal aircraft maintenance engineers from South Africa assisted by ZFDS engineers.

ZFDS Aviation Director Colonel Lasford Manchinsi disclosed that the engine installation process and all necessary engine adjustments and rigging with high performance checks were successfully done on 7th June,2023 while a 25 mins shake down flight was also carried out on 9th June,2023 and all engine parameters and aircraft maneuvers were satisfactory.

And ZFDS Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Dr.George Ng'uni the development entails that the institution now has two aircrafts to help send multiple teams for outreaches and medical evaluations.

Dr Nguni explained that ZFDS is poised to implement an operation to restore rural health centres which will take off in less than a week's time in four provinces.

He added that the operation will target to provide health services to more than 3000 people in rural areas on a daily basis and over 100,000 on a yearly basis.

ZFDS embraces technology for service delivery



The use of technology to enhance service delivery in every sector cannot be overemphasized.

And in the delivery of efficient health services, the use of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles commonly known as drones in delivering medical supplies such as blood and blood products as well as critical medicines is one innovation that governments are exploring which includes Zambia. The use of drones is one possible solution to improvement of efficiencies in the delivery system.

Rwanda is one country where drones have been in use over a period of time, to that end the government constituted a multi-disciplinary team to travel to Rwanda on a study tour to understand how the drones program operates and make recommendations to possible deployment in the country.

The team comprised expertise from the following organizations: Zambia Flying Doctor Service (ZFDS), Zambia National Public Health Institute (ZNPHI), Zambia National Blood

Transfusion Service (ZNBTS), Zambia Medicines and Medical Supplies Agency (ZAMMSA), Zambia Civil Aviation Authority (ZCAA) and Ministry of Health ICT. The Zambia Flying Doctor service with its vast experience in aviation and aeromedical services intend to include the use of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles to its fleet of planes.

Once implemented these mobile UAVs will help in reducing distances within each province that comes about due to the vastness of the country and thereby reducing the turnaround time of health products in transit.

The target audience are the health facilities in both rural and urban areas.

In addition, in times of any massive disaster either due to natural or artificial causes, drones will be handy in capturing real-time photos or videos to assist the organization and other stakeholders to implement appropriate interventions with the shortest possible time.

ZFDS INTRODUCES TELEMEDICINE



The use of technology applications in health care delivery mobile device has transformed many aspects of medical practice. In many countries technology has become common in most health care settings, leading to rapid growth in the development of medical software applications for these platforms.

Despite numerous apps that are now available to assist health institutions in delivering quality health services, the medical department under Zambia Flying Doctor services has embarked on a project to implement Tele medicine health application.

As an institution the tele medicine APP will be utilized to provide services to clients at a distance such as real time disease diagnosis, immediate treatment interventions, schedule of appointment to meet doctors at a specified time, bookings for minor surgery, booking for radiology services Xray, scans, Antenatal services, growth monitoring or under five clinic appointments which will be

done outside the normal schedules or provided for outside the clinic on assessment, booking for home based physiotherapy, booking for dental, ophthalmology services. An added service applicable to our institution could be call for evacuation of patients using our specialized ambulances or aircraft in the company of our health personnel.

Mode of delivery

The application includes real Interaction among clinicians and patients in discussing challenging clinical cases, digital monitored physical therapy, forwarding of tests for interpretation. The advantages of the use of such a service include, less time in waiting, on demand options, less chance of being exposed to other ailments in the clinical set up, no need to take time off work, no transport cost, more follow ups which culminate into better health.

ZFDS MOP UP UNDER FIVE CHILDREN IN HARD TO REACH AREA



The reported new cases of polio in the neighboring country Malawi early this year triggered an action among countries in the Southern African region to carry out mass vaccination campaign.

The country's Minister of Health Hon. Sylvia T. Masebo launched the second round of National Child health week and oral polio vaccine campaign exercise in June this year.

The exercise which was implemented from 19th – 25th June 2023 targeted to protect under five children.

Speaking during the Launch Ms.Masebo informed the nation that government has heightened surveillance for polio and measure had been put in place to keep the country safe. Zambia Flying Doctor Service (ZFDS) working within its mandate, serviced the rural parts of the country by effectively immunizing children against polio by walking door to door.

The Service undertook the activities in Tumbama (west 5) Lukulu district – Western Province, Moroma, Mkushi – Central Province and Luamfula Sowezi – North Western province. The three medical teams were able to

capture 1,587 childrenunder five in the three respective areas.

Traditional leader, Headman Tumbama of the Nkoya people in Lukulu district whose village was visited applauded ZFDS for revamping its operations in the area.

Headman Tumbama recollected that ZFDS did establish and built structures in the area in the late 1950 which enhanced health service delivery in the area.

He said he was happy that the institution had chosen his chiefdom to undertake the campaign which he described as important in pushing to safeguard the health of children.

"it is a huge relief to see ZFDS in our communities because the institution has served us for a very long time and saved us the money expected to spend traveling long distance to access theses services brought to our door step.

We walk long kilometers to access health services and transport is a huge challenge in my chiefdoom as people rely on oxcarts.

I am happy that my village will be free of polio outbreak,".

ZFDS TO DOUBLE OUTREACH EFFORTS IN 2023

Zambia Flying Doctor Service-ZFDS Chief Executive Officer GEORGE NG'UNI says the service is on the verge of signing a Memorandum of Understanding with the Zambia Air Force to use ZAF choppers to reach out to the remotest areas of the country.

Dr. NG'UNI notes that it has been hard to provide healthcare services especially in the rainy season due to the conditions of some airstrips.

He has also assured Zambians that the service will double it's outreach efforts once it's other aircraft resumes flying. Speaking when he paid a courtesy call on Paramount Chief Chiti Mukulu of the Bemba speaking people, Dr. NG'UNI said the engine of the spare aircraft is undergoing an overhaul and is expected to be brought back by the end of the month. Meanwhile, Chief Chiti Mukulu commended the ZFDS management for reviving the service and sticking to it's mandate.

The Paramount Chief said Northern Province is one of the most underdeveloped Provinces in the country and such services will help to enhance people's health.

Chief Chiti Mukulu also urged ZFDS to consider educating people in rural areas on the safe usage and general health practices because they are the experts who know advantages and effects.

A woman of Lukulu-Western province who struggled with blindness for over two years had her sight restored after the Zambia Flying Doctor Service conducted outreach activities in the area. The woman whose blindness was caused by cataracts which clogged her sight and she could not see her newly born child until after the surgery.

The cataract surgery which was conducted by the ZFDS medical team was successful and the patient was able to see again.

Chief Mpezeni says it is unfortunate that men only seek medical attention when it's too late to be helped and hence more men dying than women. He has since hailed ZFDS for the good work they are doing by providing medical services to the hard to reach areas of Zambia.

ZFDS Responds to Chief Mwata Kazembe



Zambia Flying Doctor Service was in Mwansabombwe in February and they provided medical services to some remote parts of the district and returned again in March 2023 at the request of Chief MWATA KAZEMBE of the Lunda-speaking people of Luapula province.

ZFDS Director Medical Dr. Goft Chiyobeka explains that when ZFDS Chief Executive Officer GEORGE N'GUNI paid a courtesy call to Chief MWATA KAZEMBE in February 2023, the traditional leader requested that fishing camps that have turned into villages are in dire need of medical services, especially malaria mitigation measures.

PARLIAMETARY COMMITTEE ON HEALTH APPLUADS ZFDS



The Parliamentary Committee on Health, Community Development and Social Services Chairperson Dr. Christopher Kalila has commended the Zambia Flying Doctor Service for its effort to address period poverty, menstrual and hygiene practices in Peri - urban areas such as Kitwe's Mwekera settlement by training girls in the production of re-usable sanitary pads and sinking a borehole at the school.

Speaking when the committee visited Mwekera Combined School on the 30th of May,2023 to appreciate the projects that ZFDS was implementing Dr. Kalila commended ZFDS,for initiating the projects amidist scarce resources.

The Vice Chairperson for the Parliamentary Committee on Health, Community Development and Social Services Ms. Majory Nakaponda was elated and proud of Zambia Flying Doctor Service (ZFDS) for its effort to address menstrual and hygiene practices in Peri - urban areas.

Hon. Nakaponda who is also ISOKA Member of Parliament (MP) stressed that lack of access to affordable sanitary pads by adolescent girls in Peri - urban and rural areas had resulted in poor performance in schools as most girls tend to drop out of school.

And speaking at the same event, ZFDS Chief Executive Officer Dr. George Ng'uni said the Service was called to action after it was brought to its attention of the prevailing health threats among the girls who used leaves during their menses and threw the leaves in the the nearby stream.

Dr.Ng'uni added that a risk of a disease outbreak was looming around as girls washed off in the same stream that the Community uses and hence it was prudent to collaborate on an Intiative that will provide safe, clean and running water for the pupils.

Mwekera Combined School Head Teacher Mr. Christopher Chongo expressed gratitude to ZFDS for coming to the aid of the school and intimated that with the access to clean water it would not only help the pupils but the surrounding community as well.

The Zambia Flying Doctor Service in Partnership with Forum for Women Accountants in Zambia trained girls at Mwekera Combined School in the production of reusable sanitary pads and also sunk a borehole at a cost of over K60,000 as part of its Corporate Social Responsibility.

Stakeholder Relations

The Zambia Flying Doctor Service ZFDS signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Zambia Air Force ZAF for provision of aircraft, aircrew and aircraft maintenance personnel. Speaking during the signing ceremony, ZFDS Board Chairperson ROSEMARY KUMWENDA said ZFDS is faced with quiet a number of challenges to effectively carry out its mandate, such as a lack of sufficient aircrafts to conduct medical evacuations and medical outreach programs simultaneously which is why the MoU has come at the right time. Dr. KUMWENDA said ZFDS reached out to ZAF for provision of equipment and services to assist with flying and maintaining the ZFDS aircraft to enhance delivery of aviation-based medical services. She said ZAF has been a reliable partner for ZFDS for emergency medical evacuations in areas where the service aircraft can not land. ZAF has always provided choppers to make service delivery efficient. Dr KUMWENDA said the signing of the MoU will also outline the significance of the two institutions and showcase the importance of teamwork.

Meanwhile, ZAF Commander Lt. General COLIN BARRY said ZAF is elated by



ZFDS's commitment to its statutory mandate of combating disease and the health and ZFDS's promoting commitment to its statutory mandate of ensuring that the wellbeing of inhabitants of the rural areas in the country. In a speech read on his behalf by Chief of Training Brig. General KAMIMA NYIRENDA, Lt. General BARRY said ZAF is proud to be associated with such efforts to enhance quality health in its service to the country. He said ZAF is continually looking for opportunities out to carry constitutional mandate of coordinating with state organs and state institutions in times of public emergencies and national disasters, to serve Zambians better.

ZFDS/CZECH REPUBLIC SHARE NOTES

Leading a Team of Medical Doctors from the Zambia Flying Doctor Service (ZFDS), Minister of Health Hon.Sylvia T. Masebo (MP) travelled to Mongu-Western Province to welcome a team of surgeons from the Czech Republic Flying Doctor Service who were in the country to conduct medical outreaches in Lusaka and Mongu Districts. The action by the Czech was a response to the invitation from the Minister of Health earlier this year when she visited their country.



ZFDS worked and shared notes with the visiting team of surgeons to exchange skills and collaborate on ideas to enhance the operation of ZFDS in health service provision.

Medical Evacuations

ZFDS evacuates two accident victims



On 17th May 223, Zambia Flying Doctor Service (ZFDS) successfully evacuated two patients from NorthWestern and Southern Provinces who suffered head injuries sustained after a road traffic accident.

The Aeromedical service was undertaken on Sunday,14th May 2023 after the Ministry of Health (MOH) approved the request from the respective hospitals where they were admitted.

The two males were evacuated from Livingstone Teaching Hospital (LTH) and Loloma Mission Hospital (Mafinga) respectively.

The patients were in the care of the University Teaching Hospital (UTH)and Maina Soko Military Hospital (MSH), where they were receiving medical treatment.

Kalulushi resident with lung tumor evacuated

The government has evacuated Fifty-Three (53) year-old Emmanuel Kashila of Kalulushi district in the Copperbelt Province diagnosed with a lung tumour to the University Teaching Hospital (UTH) in Lusaka to enable him to receive greater medical attention.

The Aeromedical evacuation was undertaken by the Zambia Flying Doctor Service (ZFDS) on the 24th of June 2023 following Ministry of Health approval. Kalulushi District Hospital where the patient was admitted had written to the Ministry requesting that the patient be Air – evacuated.

ZFDS Airmen and Medical personnel landed at Kalulushi South Down Airport at 17:10 hours to pick up the patient and landed at Kenneth Kaunda International Airport in Lusaka at 18:30 hours.

Medical staff from UTH were stationed at the airport to land transport the patient to the facility where he is currently admitted.

Ministry of Health (MOH) has accelerated Aeromedical medical care under ZFDS to save more lives.



ZFDS evacuates 5 months old boy



Zambia Flying Doctor Service (ZFDS) evacuated a five months old boy suffering from hydrocephalus from Nalikwanda in Mongu District to the University Teaching Hospital (UTH) in the second quarter.

The baby boy was discovered by the ZFDS doctors during the five-day medical outreach conducted in Nalikwanda area of Mongu District.

Hydrocephalus is the abnormal accumulation of cerebral spinal fluid inside the ventricles of the brain also known as "water baby syndrome" this results in a rapid increase in the size of the baby's head compared to age.

Hydrocephalus, if left untreated, can cause permanent brain damage, physical and mental impairment, and even death.

During their outreach, the ZFDS team set up temporal medical camps at

Namusheshe, Liande, Litawa, Lukweta and Nalikwanda Rural Health posts where services such as general screening, laboratory, eye screening, dental screening, radiology and pharmacy where provided.

The team also donated mattresses and beds to a maternity wing at Namusheshe Rural Health Post to demonstrate ZFDS' committeemnt to supporting the community well-being and addressing maternal health-care needs as part of the Corporate social responsibility.

And INDUNA KATANEKWA of Lyomboka Village commended ZFDS for the vital medical assistance which was accessed by thousands of residents who were attended to during the outreach.

ZFDS continues to be a beacon of hope for remote communities, ensuring that quality of health care reaches the most vulnerable communities.

ZFDS evacuates victim of crocodile attack



A nine year old boy of Nyawa village in Kazungula district has lost a right arm after he was attacked by a crocodile while swimming in a river with his friends.

His father, STANFORD MAKALICHI has narrated to ZNBC News that OBREY MAKALICHI was only rescued from the Jaws of the crocodile by a passerby who heard a cry for help.

He says unfortunately by the time the boy was retrieved from the water, his right arm was badly damaged.

The boy who is currently at the Livingstone Teaching Hospital was evacuated in the early hours of this morning by Zambia Flying Doctor Service who are in Nyawa chiefdom for an outreach programme.

And Livingstone Teaching Hospital General Surgeon, MUTUNA CHIWELE confirmed the boy was in surgery and his right arm has been amputated.

Dr. CHIWELE says the boy is currently stable and undergoing treatment.

Meanwhile, Chief Nyawa od the Tonga speaking people of Kazungula District has appealed to government to construct more health facilities in his chiefdom in order for people to receive medical care as close to their homes as possible.

He said this when Zambia Flying Doctor Service paid a courtesy call on him at his Palace and added that the few facilities in his chiefdom are not enough to Service the over 2 hundred thousand people.

And Zambia Flying Doctor Services-ZFDS Public Relations Manager, NAMBULA SILILO says the organisation is currently in Kazungula district for an outreach programme providing primary health care and specialised surgeries in hard to reach places.

She says the organisation has put up strategies to reach farmers during this farming season to help improve their health for them to be more productive and contribute to growing the country's food security.

ZFDS Evacuates accident victims



4 victims of Saturday's road traffic accident in Mkushi have been successfully evacuated to Lusaka for further medical treatment.

The Zambia Flying Doctor Service plane carrying the patients arrived at Lusaka city airport at 09:15 hours.

The patients were received by officials from the Government, the Football Association of Zambia and officers from the Zambia Air Force.

Speaking through a representative from the Ministry, Sports Minister ELVIS NKANDU said every athlete's life matters

which is why the Government has intervened to provide the best medical care for the team.

NKANDU said his office will closely monitor the recovery of the players and will continue to work with the ministry of health.

And Zambia Flying Doctor Service Chief Executive Officer GEORGE NGUNI has thanked the Government for the support rendered to the institution to enable it to operate smoothly. Speaking through ZFDS Director Operations Colonel LASFORD MANCHISI Dr NGUNI said the patients are steadily recovering and were flown with the best care possible.

Meanwhile, Communications Manager SYDNEY MUNGALA said the Association will cover all funeral costs for those that died and has provided transport for those that needed to travel back to Solwezi.
